Masseria Trapana

Seemingly situated in the middle of nowhere (although it's only a 10-minute journey from the main town of Lecce) Masseria Trapana, a fortified farmhouse that dates back to the 16th Century, has been lovingly restored by the affable Australian Rob Potter-Sanders. Once ensconced within its six beautiful gardens with picture-perfect swimming pool surrounded by plum trees, petting roaming resident cat Rosie, you'll never want to leave. There are nine suites, most boasting rooftop bathtubs or outdoor showers. Attention to detail is everything here, right down to the Aesop products in the bedrooms. Come nighttime, the fire pit in the garden scattered with Moroccan cushions makes a wonderful location for stargazing. Don't leave without asking for a tour of the ancient olive press, still in its original condition and housed underground in the courtyard.
